Quarter 2 Expectations

Reading

To receive an "S" in reading your child must:

- Be a 3Y reader with .4 points
- Know at least 20-25 1G power words at flash speed.
- Be able to identify all 26 letters and sounds
- Be able to retell and identify story parts of a text (characters, setting, beginning, middle, end)
- Identify main topic and key details
- Describe the connection between 2 individuals, events, or pieces of information in a text
- Ask and answer questions about unknown words in a text
- Ask and answer questions about key details in a text
- Blend and segment onsets and rimes of single-syllable words (c-at = cat) (truck = tr-uck)
- Isolate and pronounce the initial, medial vowel, and final sounds in CVC words (c-a-t)
- Add or substitute individual sounds in simple words (hat-cat-sat) (pat-pit)
- Blend spoken words together to make compound words (cup-cake = cupcake)
- Clap or tap syllables in spoken words (but-ter-fly = 3 syllables)
- Say a word that rhymes with 2 given words (cat, hat, _____)

To receive an "E" in reading your child must:

- Do all the above independently
- Be a 2G reader or above
- Know 30 2G power words at flash speed.

Writing To receive an "S" your child must:

- Be able to identify the parts of a "fabulous sentence"
- · Be able to copy a sentence stem
- · Be able to draw an on topic picture
- · Uses multiple colors in their picture
- Be able to use their writing tools correctly (paper, pencil, crayons, etc.)
- · Has writing stamina for 15-20 minutes
- · Shows effort towards their writing
- Be a "got it" writer on rubric (see picture below)

To receive an "E" your child must:

- · Do all of the above
- · Be an "expert" writer (see picture below)

<u>Math</u>

To receive an "S" in math your child must:

- Be able to identify and name 2D & 3D shapes in the environment.
- Be able to analyze and compare 2D & 3D shapes
- Describe measurable attributes of objects (length, height, weight).
- Compare 2 objects with a measurable attribute (taller, shorter, etc).
- Identify whether a number of objects in a group are greater than, less than, or equal to another group.

To receive an "E" in math your child must:

- Complete all of the above independently.
- Analyze a problem and prove how the thinking is incorrect or correct.
- Justify their reasoning and thinking by constructing viable arguments.
- Use hidden partners in numbers to justify comparisons of cube sticks.
- Be able to use correct terminology when comparing objects
- Use positional words to locate shapes

<u>ALU</u>

To receive an "S" in ALU your child must:

- Be able to sort by color, size, shape, temperature, and weight
- Be able to recognize that the shape of materials can be changed
- Be able to observe that a push or pull can change the way an object is moving
- Can investigate that things move in different ways, such as fast, slow, etc.
- Develop an understanding of how to use and create a timeline
- Be able to compare children and families of today with those in the past
- Be able to recognize the importance of celebrations and national holidays as a way of remembering people, events and our nation's ethnic heritage.

To receive an "E" in ALU your child must:

 Complete all of the above and consistently meet the expert requirements on the ALU rubrics.

Behavior & Work Habits

- <u>Shares teachers attention</u>- Can wait patiently for a teacher and use the "Help Board".
- <u>Displays self confidence</u>- Believes in himself/herself and uses the words "not yet" instead of "I can't".
- <u>Practice self control</u>- Keeps hands, feet and body to himself/herself. Respects personal space. Building stamina to stay focused during a benchmark lesson. Uses coping strategies when upset.
- <u>Accepts responsibility for his or her own behavior</u>- Understands and accepts why he or she is losing a Dojo point.
- <u>Follows class and school rules</u>- Follows the 3 Be's with minimal teacher support.
- Respects the feelings and views of others— Uses kind words towards others.
- Respects school personnel Treats all staff members with respect.
- Respects class and school property
 Uses school materials appropriately.
- Manages personal needs

 Uses bathroom independently. Knows when to get a tissue. Washes hands independently. Knows when to ask for help when they can not solve a problem. Unpacks backpack in the morning independently. Packs up backpack in the afternoon independently.
- <u>Listens attentively-</u> Listens to the directions in a video on their activity list. Listens to the teacher during a benchmark or small group lesson.
- <u>Shows effort</u>- Try their personal best when a challenge arises. Works on a task until completed. Able to start an activity independently.
- <u>Follows directions</u>- Follows teacher directions and listens to the directions to complete an activity.
- <u>Works well independently</u>- **Stays on task with limited** redirection. Able to start an activity independently.
- <u>Works cooperatively</u>- Keeps hands to self, uses nice talk, takes turns, shares, remains on task with partner, etc.
- <u>Completes class work</u>- Completes work in a timely manner, limited redirection, does their personal best.
- <u>Shows organization</u>- Manage classroom materials, cleans up after themselves, keeping their work folder/cubbies organized.
- <u>Fine muscle control</u>- Able to use scissors, hold their writing utensils properly, fasten clothing, put shoes and socks on independently.
- Large muscle control Control your own body in relation to others.
- Handwriting legibility- Able to form legible letters.
